in the Sum of Thirty Five Pounds of good and
lawful Money of Great-Britain to be paid to him the said
Commissionary his certain Attorney Executors,
Administrators or assigns; For the Payment whereof well
and truly to be made, We oblige ourselves and each of us
by ourselves, for the whole and the full, our Heirs, Executors and ad-
ministrators, firmly by these Presents. Sealed with our Seals Given
the Twentieth Day of the Month of September in the
Year of our Lord One Thousand Seven Hundred and Forty Seven

THE Condition of this Obligation is such, That if the above bounden
Mary Robuck Widow and
Administratrix of all and singular the Goods, Chattels, and Credits of Richard
Robuck late of Mustron aforesaid in the Jurisdiction
of the Dean and Chapter of York Deceased,
do make, or cause to be made a true and perfect Inventory of all and singular the
Goods, Chattels and Credits of the said Deceased, which have or shall come to the
Hands, Possession or Knowledge of her the said Mary Robuck
or into the Hands and Possession of any other Person
or Persons for her and the same so made, do Exhibit, or cause to be Exhibited
into the Registry of the Dean & Chapter's Court in York at or before the
Twentieth Day of March next ensuing. And the same Goods,
Chattels and Credits, and all other the Goods, Chattels and Credits of the said
Deceased, at the Time of his Death, which at any Time after shall come to the
Hands or Possession of the said Mary Robuck
or into the Hands and Possession of any other Person or Persons for her do well and truly
Administer according to the Law. And further do make, or cause to be made, a true
and just Account of her said Administration at or before the Twentieth
Day of September next ensuing, and all the rest and Residue of the
said Goods, Chattels and Credits, which shall be found remaining upon the said
Administration Account, the same being first examined and allowed of by the
Judge or Judges, for the time being of the said Court, shall deliver and pay
unto such Person or Persons respectively, as the said Judge or Judges by his or
their Decree or Sentence, pursuant to the true Intent and Meaning of the Act of
Parliament in that behalf made, shall limit and appoint. And if it shall hereafter
appear, that any last Will and Testament was made by the said Deceased, and the
Executor or Executors therein named, do exhibit the same into the said Court
making request to have it allowed and approved accordingly, if the said
Mary Robuck within bounden, being thereunto
required do render and deliver the said Letters of Administration (approbation
of such Testament being first had and made) in the said Court, then this Obligation
to be void, and of none effect or else to remain in full Force and Vertue.
